Thursday, April 20, from 12–1:00 pm in the Lawrence Public Library Auditorium, 707 Vermont St. Our guest speaker will be Becky Fast, Director of Constituent Services for Dennis Moore, Representative to Congress for Kansas' Third Congressional District, which includes Johnson and Wyandotte counties and part of Douglas County. Becky has titled her talk *Advocacy Tools for Working with Elected Officials*. She will focus on ways that groups and individuals can be more effective in dealing with elected officials at all levels. We look forward to learning from Becky. In addition, she will happily answer any of our questions. So if you have any questions regarding recent or pending legislation, plan to attend.



About our speaker: Becky Fast joined Congressman Moore after his first election and helped him set up his constituent services operation in the district. In addition to assisting Congressman Moore, she is a regular adjunct professor at the KU School of Social Welfare where she has taught Social Policy and Program Analysis and has served as a practicum instructor. Previous to working for Congressman Moore she managed research and training grants at the School of Social Welfare, University of Kansas. She conducted program evaluations for the Kansas Department of Aging and Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and provided trainings for social workers and case managers. During her time at KU, she had the opportunity to publish a training manual and a journal article on the strengths model of case management with older adults.

Ms. Fast holds a master's degree in social work and public administration from the University of Kansas. She is a graduate of Leadership Lawrence class of 2002 and currently serves on the Douglas County United Way Board of Directors and the Greater Kansas City Women's Political Caucus.

Annual Committee and Other Reports, 2005–2006

Funds Development Committee. LWV L-DC held two fundraising activities in 2005–2006: the traditional letter campaign and HoopsMania. The letter was sent out mid-March. Contributions are already coming in, but data are available yet regarding its overall success.

HoopsMania, based on the NCAA men's basketball tournament, netted League \$607.50 with ticket sales at 81. This is a wonderful return on a first year effort! We look forward to using this fundraiser again.

Membership Committee. LWV L-DC is the second largest chapter in the state. The Johnson County League has 171 members, but we reported 150 members to National this year, which is an increase of a total of 32 members over last year's official count. Topeka-Shawnee County is number three with 112 members, and Manhattan-Riley County comes in fourth with 106.

Our chapter co-sponsored a forum on immigration issues, which was initiated by the Latino Community Coalition. The facilitator for this community organization is one of our new members this year, Lydia León. I attended the forum to distribute information about the League and to register voters.

We also participated in the MAINstream Coalition's "Take Back Kansas" event. Caleb Morse and I staffed a table at this event, which had a standing room only crowd of over 300. Participants in this event were asked to volunteer for all types of political activities by completing a survey of their interests. One attendee became a member of the League and twelve others checked off on their surveys that they would like to hear more from us. I will contact them to see if they would like to join.

I have not held a new members orientation this year, but I am working on setting one up sometime this spring.

We are currently in the process of determining whether we have any local members who might be eligible for their 50-year membership in the League. If you know of anyone who might be eligible, please contact me (838–4206; ArlaJones@sunflower.com).

Land Use Committee. The Land Use Committee (LUC) met 13 times between May 2005 and March 2006. Generally the Committee meets once a month to discuss items on the agenda of the Lawrence-Douglas County Planning Commission. The Planning Commission has so much business now that it is regularly holding public meetings twice a month, on Monday and Wednesday of the third week. Of course, this means that the LUC also has more business than in the past.

The Committee reviews the staff reports on the agenda items and any other information that may be available. When the Committee disagrees with the staff's recommendation or finds it lacking in some respects, it directs comments to the Planning Commission. During the past year, the Committee sent 24 letters to the Planning Commission and one to the Lawrence City Commission. In addition, Committee members made oral presentations at Commission meetings several times.

Most of the cases involve proposals for new development, in the form of subdivision plats, rezoning applications, requests for variances, and development plans. These are usually located on the fringes of Lawrence or in rural areas of Douglas County. The most controversial area has been on the northwest side of Lawrence, north of Sixth St. It turns out that the City (or perhaps its consultants) did not anticipate the rapid growth of this area and now the sewer capacity is inadequate for desired growth. Hence some of the development proposals are on hold at this time. Another controversial area is on the southeast side of Lawrence, south of Route K-10 and near the jail. Some people want this area to be primarily industrial; some want it to be primarily residential.

Lately the Planning Commission has also devoted time to reviewing and revising its comprehensive plan, *Horizon 2020*, and its development code, which includes zoning and subdivision regulations. These projects are still in process. The LUC often makes comments on the revisions. Sometimes it sends the Commission a CD with the document annotated with detailed suggestions for changes.

On last December 4, the Committee held a special meeting to report to the local membership on the existing land use policy, which is part of the position on environmental policy. Different Committee members described the positions on economic planning, transportation planning, rural development, neighborhood planning, and environmental planning.

The future of planning in this community is uncertain at this time because Linda Finger, who had been Planning Director for 12 years, resigned as of December 31. It is rumored that City officials blamed her for the failure to anticipate growth in the northwest area and thus hold up development. In any event, the position of Planning Director is currently vacant. Since the City Manager, Mike Wildgen, resigned in March, it is likely to be a long time before a new Planning Director is hired. Presumably the new City Manager will want to make the choice of who becomes Planning Director. The LUC sent the Mayor a message requesting that it be represented on the search committee for the new Planning Director. The Mayor sent a polite reply but made no promises.

Alan Black is Chair of the Committee, but Betty Lichtwardt does most of the work. Others who have participated in Committee meetings include Peggy Baker, Jennifer Dropkin, Marci Francisco, Melinda Henderson, Gwen Klingenberg, Carrie Lindsey, Caleb Morse, and Byron and Eleanor Wenger. I apologize if I forgot someone.

Local Studies Proposed for Consideration at Annual Meeting

As reported in the March *Voter*, three local studies were proposed by LWV L-DC members: [1] **Review and update** the Land Use position with a study on the City/County comprehensive plan, *Horizon 2020*. [2] **Carry out a new study** of transportation, incorporating a more regional view of transportation into the environmental policy position (possibly a subsidiary of 1). [3] **Carry out a new study** of policies on sidewalk installation and maintenance in the city of Lawrence.

After considering the other projects we have still to complete and what appear to be diminishing numbers of interested participants in League activities, at its February meeting the Board opted not to recommend adoption any of these studies. However, each will be presented for consideration and adoption by the general membership at Annual Meeting on April 15.

Proposed Changes to Statement of Position on PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AND BIKEWAYS

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION (Approved 1971)

The League of Women Voters of Lawrence-Douglas County supports public transportation for the City of Lawrence. Local and federal governments should share responsibility for meeting local transportation needs. The City should see that comprehensive bus service is provided, either as a city owned or as a private, subsidized service. ~~The City should investigate federal funds available for mass transportation.~~

~~The League believes that transportation by bus can be encouraged through introduction of innovative methods, such as, but not limited to, dial-a-bus plans, persuasive advertising and educational campaigns, and combined school-city bus service.~~ A reduction in the number of cars driven to the ~~High School~~ [high schools] is desirable.

~~The League believes that public transportation needs are not being met in some areas of the city, particularly those areas with greater numbers of low income and elderly citizens.~~ Bus routes should be planned to provide service to those persons needing it most, while trying to maximize the number of riders.

Transportation needs should be an important consideration in city planning in the future. ~~A comprehensive bus system would reduce air pollution and traffic congestion, thereby providing greater safety for pedestrians and bicyclists.~~

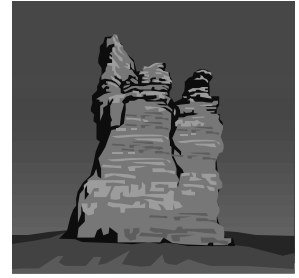

March 15. All local League Presidents have received the information for Convention registration and lodging, and just this week, received a personal invitation from Marlys Robertson to attend. Marlys is 2nd VP for LWVUS, is responsible for Convention planning, and is our liaison to the LWVUS Board. Each League is entitled to one voting delegate/100 members; other members are encouraged to attend. Conventions are a wonderful source of new ideas and new friends, and give you an opportunity to build a great network of Leaguers from around the country with whom you can share ideas and learn of innovative ways to improve our Leagues.



It is a true pleasure to inform you that Donna Lauffer, former Johnson County League President and former State President, has been nominated by the LWVUS nominating committee to serve on the LWVUS Board! I believe this may be the first time (or at least in a very long time) that a Kansan has served on the LWVUS Board. This a great opportunity to show off Kansas at Convention!

The State Board met Saturday, March 11 and discussed/decided the following: Finalized agenda for State Council and identified potential speakers for lunch, and breakout sessions. • Accepted a proposed budget that calls for *no* dues increase, but does provide for a small amount of money to use for a part-time lobbyist on social services issues. • Received a report on several new updates on our state website (www.lwvk.com) and learned that we are averaging 32 hits/day on the website. • Discussed the proposal to study a name change for LWV, but made no decision to support or oppose (see below). • Agreed that the Endowment Fund Trustees would cash in our Zero Coupon Bonds and invest the money in a federally insured money market account, or similar account, as approved in the Endowment Fund Articles.

This week, the state League, the Topeka-Shawnee County League, and the Kansas Sunshine Coalition co-hosted Sunshine Day in the Capitol. All legislators received a flyer inviting them to stop by our table, pick up literature on the Sunshine Coalition and open government, and have a glass of orange juice and some orange cookies. We had a great number of legislators and/or their secretaries stop by.

On the State Presidents e-mail list, there has been considerable discussion about changing the name of the League. Much of the discussion has been premised on the fact that our name implies we aren't open to male members, and because our membership is declining nationally, a more "inclusive sounding" name could be beneficial. There will be a caucus on this topic at Convention, with the end goal to develop some sort of study on the LWV name. I hope you will discuss this among your members and ask your Convention attendees to participate in the caucus. I would also appreciate it if you would share your thoughts with me on this topic prior to Convention.

We had a very successful Day at the Capitol, with about 40 Leaguers and members of AAUW attending. Lougene Marsh, Director of the Flint Hills Community Health Center, and a member of the Emporia League, talked to us about the realities of Health Care and Health Choices. Her presentation was excellent and she has agreed to share a condensed version via the upcoming *Kansas Voter*

State Council—April 29 in Lawrence—the formal invites to State Council meeting, along with registration forms, will be in the mail and on e-mail later this week.

The Kansas League has grown this year! Comparing totals from the 2005-2006 League year with those of the 2006-2007 League year, we have grown from 740 to 780 members—that's a 5.4% increase. Congratulations and thanks for your hard work in making this happen. How about another 5% next year?

LWV L-DC March Board Meeting in Brief



March 8, Lawrence High School Library.

Present: Carrie Lindsey, president, Marjorie Cole, Carolyn Coleman, Kay Hale, Aline Hoey, Arla Jones, Caleb Morse, Paula Schumacher, Donna Swall, Rusty Thomas, and visitor Melissa Warren.

Carrie reported that she had lunch with LWVK President Janis McMillen the week before and learned that ours is the second largest League in the state with 150 members, up from 118 last year. Carrie also announced that she is moving from Lawrence to Virginia this summer.

The League is participating with the Living Wage Alliance and LAN in putting together a Housing Fair. \$3000 has been received from the City. The mayor is in the process of appointing an affordable housing task force and League needs a volunteer to serve on it.

Matt Cohen, director of the film *Call It Democracy*, will be in Kansas this summer. We hope to show the film while he's here.

Carolyn, Arla, and Caleb met with Lawrence High School politics teacher Fran Bartlett to

discuss presenting a forum on different aspects of government and other public institutions.

After discussion five topics were chosen: voting and elections, the judicial system, the legislative process, political parties and special interests, and the media. The discussions, which will include speakers from each area, will be held the first Thursday of each month in May–September.

Aline, Arla, and Kathy Branson will be meet to determine a recipient of this year's Stucky Scholarship sometime after the March 9 deadline.

A state board meeting this weekend will determine the speakers for State Council Meeting, to be held in Lawrence on April 29. Cost of the meeting will be \$50 per delegate. National Convention will be in Minneapolis from June 10–13, with a pre-convention training session on June 9. The registration fee of \$285 is due May 19.
